Film Summary: What are teenagers capable of? Experience a heart-stopping, inspirational year with Darien EMS-Post 53 — the only ambulance service for the 20,000 residents of Darien, Connecticut — as it covers a deadly stretch of highway, responds to over 1,500 emergency calls, and is run by high school teenagers.

HIGH SCHOOL 9-1-1 explores this one-of-a-kind organization through the eyes and voices of the high school students running it. The film opens minds, shatters stereotypes, and sheds light on what teenagers are capable of when given the opportunity by the adults in their lives.

Goal: The film strives to inspire and empower teenagers and to motivate the adults in their lives — parents, educators, school administrators, community leaders — to create opportunities for them to become empowered, learn by doing, and make a difference in their communities.

"Last Saturday, I went to a screening of the documentary High School 9-1-1 at the San Pedro Film Festival and was blown away. The film is about an EMS unit in Darien, CT, 100% run and governed by high school teenagers. FILM THEMES

UNDERESTIMATING THE CAPABILITIES OF TEENAGERS

Teenagers are capable of extraordinary things when given the opportunity by the adults in their lives. Teens tend to achieve expectations adults establish. Thus, setting the bar too low can be just as detrimental as setting the bar too high in terms of the success of a young person's individual growth.

EMPOWERING YOUNG PEOPLE THROUGH RESPONSIBILITY

Adult Advisors at Darien EMS-Post 53 mentor young members and teach them a multitude of managerial, critical thinking and emergency medical skills and then give them the responsibility to implement what they've learned by running their own EMS organization. By being given the responsibility to practice the skills they've been taught, the teenage members become empowered to succeed.

LEARNING BY DOING

Education has long been focused on book knowledge and creating strong test takers. Darien-EMS Post 53 was founded on the principle "learning by doing," for when knowledge is put into practical use that is when true knowledge is not only obtained but, more importantly, retained.

TEENAGERS EXPERIENCING THE ADULT WORLD

Should a 14, 15, 16, 17 year old child be exposed to intense emergency calls, calls that may result in death? There are, and will always be, strong opinions as to whether it is detrimental to a teenager's mental and emotional health now and in the future to experience these situations. In the end, it is up to individual parents to determine whether they want their child to see life and death up close. For the nearly 1000 Post 53 alumni who have gone through the program over the last 50 years, as well as the countless adults who have supported the organization, the benefits of experiencing these situations far outweigh the negatives. Above and beyond the extensive training the teens go through, and the psychological safeguards put in place, what the members of Darien EMS-Post 53 gain from these experiences is a perspective on life and its fragility as well as a set of coping skills that serve them well as they face their own life challenges as an adult.

- Post 53 was the first Boy Scout Explorer Post in the country to accept female members.
- Director Tim Warren was a member of Darien EMS-Post 53 serving as VP of Operations his senior year of high The four years in the school. organization forever changed his life in a positive way.
- Of the nearly 1000 teenagers who have completed four years of membership in Post 53 over the last 50 years, approximately half have gone on to medical school or related medical fields while the rest have become successful in business and other fields including the entertainment industry.

FILMMAKERS



The film's director, **TIM WARREN**, was a member of Darien EMS–Post 53 during his high school years. Tim has spent the last two decades as an Executive Producer/Show Runner, overseeing 100's of people at a time, on shows like *Extreme Makeover: Home Edition* and *Bar Rescue* as well as a multi-camera director having twice been nominated by The Director's Guild of America for work on SPIKE's *Ink Master* and *Pros vs. Joes*.

Warren is the owner and CEO of Boomerang Productions Media, Inc. Launched in 1996, BPM incubates, develops and produces a wide range of television, film, documentary and alternative media programming for all US and international audiences. The company's name derives from its founding principle of creating projects with both positive intentions and positive actions in order to achieve positive results.

Although he didn't go into the medical field, the life skills Tim learned in Post 53—making quick decisions under extreme stress, working with others and just plain not giving up—have been invaluable to him including the making of *High School 9-1-1* which took nearly a decade to complete.

The film's producer, **KELLI JOAN BENNETT**, is an American actress, producer, writer, entrepreneur and advocate of creating from what you have. She produced and starred in the film, *Collusions*, a cerebral crime mystery with Tom Everett Scott and Tembi Locke. She was founding partner of Scriptapalooza, Inc. a company that has launched and continues to launch countless writers' careers. Her companies have been featured in Entrepreneur Business Start-Ups, Vanity Fair, Entertainment Weekly, and Variety. She graduated with a degree in Theatre Arts from California State University, Fullerton. Under her new banner, Think Outside The Box Inside The Box Media, she has three feature films in development. SCREENING EVENTS







TIM WARREN is a vailable for speaking engagements to lead discussion groups as well as to deliver Keynote Addresses and to teach Master Classes. Subjects include:

- "Emergency Medicine Applies to Everything Including Reality Television" 45 Minute Keynote Speech Warren uses photos and videos from his television and film career and speaks about how the skills he learned as a member of Darien EMS-Post 53 have applied to his successful career as a top-level Executive Producer/Show Runner and Multi-Camera Director.
- "Story Structure" A Three Hour Master Class The class begins with screening *High School 9-1-1* then Warren walks students through his creative process by breaking down, act by act, scene by scene, his documentary and how he and his team were able to edit 1200 hours of footage to create an 86-minute film.
- "Single and Multi-Camera Directing" One to Two Hour Master Class - Warren uses video examples from his television and film work to clearly explain how to properly cover a scene based on the number of cameras a director has at his or her disposal.
- "Film Diplomacy" 45 Minute Keynote Speech Warren discusses how film can be used to breakdown cultural barriers and lead to greater understanding by highlighting his diplomatic work in Russia and Ukraine with the American Film Showcase The U.S. State Department-sponsored and USC School of Cinematic Arts-produced film envoy program.


INES (15) — Sophomore, EMT in training
